Letter to ABP: break with BlackRock

The NGO Fossielvrij NL has been campaigning for Dutch pension funds to break with the world's largest asset manager BlackRock. With \$400 billion in fossil investments, BlackRock is one of the biggest drivers of climate devastation. Last month, pension fund PFZW announced it will stop its partnership with BlackRock. In a letter to the ABP board of directors, Scientists4Future calls on our pension fund ABP to follow PFZW's example and break with BlackRock too. The letter will be published on our website later this month.

What Now for Social Science and Local Collective Action?

Professor Adam Aron, Department of Psychology, University of California San Diego

Our social mobilisation for climate action has been too tiny to leave fossil fuels in the ground, global heating is accelerating, fossil finance and extraction are at record levels, the green technical transition is deeply inadequate when done for profit and assuming growth-as-usual, international law is trashed in the face of genocide, and there is now in the US, and elsewhere, a backlash against the already meagre policy gains. Beyond the problem of carbon pollution we are superseding 7 of 9 planetary boundaries.

In this presentation I will invite a discussion of the implications of these facts for our emotional lives, the kinds of struggles we might wage collectively, and the kind of social science we might do.

Reading and listening tips

Paper of the month: Attribution studies in which the probability of extreme events is linked to the changing climate have become more and more common place over the past two decades (link to review). Their use for socio-economic impacts of the climate crisis is now increasing too.

In the paper *Health losses attributed to anthropogenic climate change*, researchers explore different aspects of inequality in this field of study such as the geographic bias toward high-income countries, the dominance of Global North researchers in authorship (even in studies focusing on the Global South) and the lack of representation of vulnerable populations within countries. They also provide useful directions for the future, such as expanding research to health impacts such as infectuous diseases, mental health and malnutrition, increasing geographic diversity in study sites, and investing in and empowering researchers from the global south to lead studies.
